## Dear Parents,

Do you ever go through times when everything seems insurmountable? Probably quite often so you might relate to waking in the middle of the night, dilemmas going around in your head, questions to answer. This seems to be symptomatic for principals especially at this time of year. One of the most valued times throughout the work week is when staff gathers in prayer. Over the past few weeks, I have shared some of these reflections with the community through this Newsletter. These are centred on the Scripture being studied in the respective classes. In Kindergarten, the students are learning about the Birth of Jesus and, today, Mrs Callaghan's prayer focussed on the Gospel of St Luke 1:26-38. This story, of course, begins with the Annunciation. Much emphasis is placed on the fact that Mary said, 'Yes' to God. For this reason, Mary is viewed as the perfect disciple and one to which we look as the perfect example to follow in our own lives.

Can you think of times when you have been asked to do something very important? Take on an important role? After the initial sense of privilege, our response would likely be one to make suggestions, altering the original plan. Mary, however, was so humbled and had such faith that she completely gave herself to God in full faith of His plan, a sense of, 'Do with me whatever You please'.

It is not likely that, while we are doing the ironing or watching TV in our living room, that we will receive a visit from the Angel Gabriel with a special request from God. So how does God ask us to do His will? How do we know? I believe it is in everyday, the very ordinary things. In happy times and stressful times, like the current, is God calling on me to 'keep the faith'. Ask the Holy Spirit for the gifts of strength and right judgment to do my work – His work- as best can be.

# Gospel Reflection

# Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 25:14-30

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who

had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir", he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."

This parable teaches that God's judgment will be based on the service we render to God and to one another in accordance with the gifts that God has given to us. Our gifts, or talents, are given to us for the service of others. If we fail to use these gifts, God's judgment on us will be severe. On the other hand, if we make use of these gifts in service to the Kingdom of Heaven, we will be rewarded and entrusted with even more responsibilities. Our life of prayer helps us to discern the gifts that have been given to us by God. God's grace allows us to share in the work of serving the Kingdom of Heaven.

#### This weekend with your family...

In today's Gospel, Jesus talks about the correlation between faithfulness and responsibilities. Family life provides many opportunities to illustrate this connection for children. As children prove themselves trustworthy, they can be trusted to take on greater responsibilities. Jesus teaches us in this parable that when we show ourselves to be trustworthy in small matters; we can be trusted to participate in greater matters of responsibility. As a family, choose one thing to do this week to serve others. Conclude in prayer together, asking God's help so that your family may serve others more faithfully.

# Saint of the Week St Frances Xavier Cabrini Feast Day: 13<sup>th</sup> November



Born: 1850 :: Died: 1917

Frances was born at Lombardy in Italy. She was one of thirteen children and was raised on a farm. As a child, she dreamed about being a missionary to China. She sailed paper boats down a stream to play her "pretend game." The paper boats were ships taking missionaries to China. And she began giving up candy because in China, she probably wouldn't be able to have any.

But when she grew up, Frances was not accepted into the two convents that she asked to join. Her health was not too good, so she taught at girl's school for six years. Then a priest asked her to help

out in a small home for orphans. Things were very hard for Frances because of the lady who ran the house. Yet Frances stuck to the work, and some other generous women joined her. Together they took vows.

At last the bishop told Frances to begin her own congregation of missionary nuns, which Frances did without hesitation. This congregation is called the **Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart**.

Soon it began to grow, first in Italy and then in many other countries. Frances, whom everyone called Mother Cabrini, had always had her heart set on going to China. But it seemed that God wanted her to come to America. When Pope Leo XIII told her, "Go west, not east," the matter was settled. St. Frances Xavier Cabrini sailed for the United States and became an American citizen. She helped large numbers of Italian immigrants and was like their real mother and friend.

Mother Cabrini and her sisters found things very difficult in the beginning. The archbishop of New York even suggested that they go back to Italy. But Mother Cabrini answered, "Your excellency, the pope sent me here and here I must stay." The archbishop admired her pioneer spirit, and so she and her sisters were allowed to begin their great work for God. Schools, hospitals, and homes for children were opened up in different states.

As the years passed, Mother Cabrini made many trips to spread her congregation and its works. She founded 67 institutions, and there were always difficulties, but she put all her trust in the Sacred Heart. "It is he who is doing everything, not us," she would say. Mother Cabrini died in Chicago on December 23, 1917.

We can learn from St. Frances Xavier Cabrini that in life we may come across hardships or people who do not like what we are doing, but if you believe you are called to do something and to help people you should never give up. 

# Swimming Programme Continues Next Week for Years 1, 2 and 4

The students will need to wear their swimmers <u>underneath</u> their school uniform (they are allowed to wear their <u>sport uniform</u> each day for swimming) and will need to bring the following items with them each day:-

- Thongs or sandals to change into and wear to and from the pool
- Towel
- Underwear
- T-shirt or jacket to wear to and from the pool
- Goggles optional (these MUST be labelled)
- Swimming cap optional. The students must have their hair tied back if it is long enough to cover their eyes when wet, otherwise the swim school recommends that parents provide a labelled swim cap.
- Please note: rash vests are **not** to be worn as it is an indoor pool.

Please make sure that **everything** is labelled and that your child recognises what he/she is bringing to school. Please understand that it is the children's responsibility to look after their own belongings.


# From the Classroom of 3W
