Dear Parents,

'The Pharisees and their scribes complained to his disciples and said, 'Why do you eat and drink with tax collectors and sinners?' ³¹ Jesus said to them in reply, 'It is not those that are well who need the doctor, but the sick. ³² I have come to call not the upright but sinners to repentance.'" Luke 5: 30-32 This is lesson from St Luke's Gospel. Following is a sobering read, if you dare....

"Dear Parent:

I know. You're worried. Every day, your child comes home with a story about THAT kid. The one who is always hitting, shoving, pinching, scratching, maybe even biting other children. The one who always has to hold my hand in the hallway. The one who has a special spot at the carpet, and sometimes sits on a chair rather than the floor. The one who had to leave the block centre because blocks are not for throwing. The one who climbed over the playground fence right exactly as I was telling her to stop. The one who poured his neighbour's milk onto the floor in a fit of anger. On purpose. While I was watching. And then, when I asked him to clean it up, emptied the ENTIRE paper towel dispenser. On purpose. While I was watching.

You're worried that THAT child is detracting from your child's learning experience. You're worried that he takes up too much of my time and energy, and that your child won't get his fair share. You're worried that she is really going to hurt someone some day. You're worried that "someone" might be your child. You're worried that your child is going to start using aggression to get what she wants. You're worried your child is going to fall behind academically because I might not notice that he is struggling to hold a pencil. I know.

Your child, this year, in this classroom, at this age, is not THAT child. Your child is not perfect, but she generally follows rules. He is able to share toys peaceably. She does not throw furniture. He raises his hand to speak. She works when it is time to work, and plays when it is time to play. He can be trusted to go straight to the bathroom and straight back again with no shenanigans. I know. I know, and I am worried, too.

You see, I worry all the time. About ALL of them. I worry about your child's pencil grip, and another child's letter sounds, and that little tiny one's shyness, and that other one's chronically empty lunchbox. I worry that Gavin's coat is not warm enough, and that Talitha's dad yells at her for printing the letter B backwards. Most of my car rides and showers are consumed with the worrying.

But I know, you want to talk about THAT child. Because Talitha's backward Bs are not going to give your child a black eye.

I want to talk about THAT child, too, but there are so many things I can't tell you.

I can't tell you that she was adopted from an orphanage at 18 months.

I can't tell you that he is on an elimination diet for possible food allergies, and that he is therefore hungry ALL. THE. TIME.

I can't tell you that her parents are in the middle of a horrendous divorce, and she has been staying with her grandma.

I can't tell you that I'm starting to worry that grandma drinks.

I can't tell you that his asthma medication makes him agitated.

I can't tell you that her mum is a single parent, and so she (the child) is at school from the moment before-care opens, until the moment after-care closes, and then the drive between home and school takes 40 minutes, and so she (the child) is getting less sleep than most adults.

I can' tell you that he has been a witness to domestic violence.

That's OK, you say. You understand I can't share personal or family information. You just want to know what I am DOING about THAT child's behaviour.

I would love to tell you. But I can't.

I can't tell you that she receives speech-language services, that an assessment showed a severe language delay, and that the therapist feels the aggression is linked to frustration about being unable to communicate.

I can't tell you that I meet with his parents EVERY week, and that both of them usually cry at those meetings. I can't tell you that the child and I have a secret hand signal to tell me when she needs to sit by herself for a while

I can't tell you that he spends rest time curled in my lap because "it makes me feel better to hear your heart, Teacher."

I can't tell you that I have been meticulously tracking her aggressive incidents for 3 months, and that she has dropped from 5 incidents a day, to 5 incidents a week.

I can't tell you that the school secretary has agreed that I can send him to the office to "help" when I can tell he needs a change of scenery.

I can't tell you that I have stood up in a staff meeting and, with tears in my eyes, BEGGED my colleagues to keep an extra close eye on her, to be kind to her even when they are frustrated that she just punched someone AGAIN, and this time, RIGHT IN FRONT OF A TEACHER.

The thing is, there are SO MANY THINGS I can't tell you about THAT child. I can't even tell you the good stuff. I can't tell you that his classroom job is to water the plants, and that he cried with heartbreak when one of the plants died over winter break.

I can't tell you that she kisses her baby sister goodbye every morning, and whispers "You are my sunshine" before mum pushes the stroller away.

I can't tell you that he knows more about thunderstorms than most meteorologists.

I can't tell you that she often asks to help sharpen the pencils during playtime.

I can't tell you that she strokes her best friend's hair at rest time.

I can't tell you that when a classmate is crying, he rushes over with his favourite stuffy from the story corner.

The thing is, dear parent, that I can only talk to you about YOUR child. So, what I can tell you is this: If ever, at any point, YOUR child, or any of your children, becomes THAT child....

I will not share your personal family business with other parents in the classroom.

I will communicate with you frequently, clearly, and kindly.

I will make sure there are tissues nearby at all our meetings, and if you let me, I will hold your hand when you crv.

I will advocate for your child and family to receive the highest quality of specialist services, and I will cooperate with those professionals to the fullest possible extent.

I will make sure your child gets extra love and affection when she needs it most.

I will be a voice for your child in our school community.

I will, no matter what happens, continue to look for, and to find, the good, amazing, special, and wonderful things about your child.

I will remind him and YOU of those good amazing special wonderful things, over and over again.

And when another parent comes to me, with concerns about YOUR child ...

I will tell them all of this, all over again.

Gospel Reflection

Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ The King, Year A

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 25:31-46

Jesus said to his disciples: 'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, escorted by all the angels, then he will take his seat on his throne of glory. All the nations will be assembled before him and he will separate men one from another as the shepherd separates sheep from goats. He will place the sheep on his right hand and the goats on his left. Then the King will say to those on his right

hand, "Come, you whom my Father has blessed, take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you made me welcome; naked and you clothed me, sick and you visited me, in prison and you came to see me." Then the virtuous will say to him in reply, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you; or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and make you welcome; naked and clothe you; sick or in prison and go to see you?" And the King will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you did this to one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it to me." Next he will say to those on his left hand, "Go away from me, with your curse upon you, to the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you never gave me food; I was thirsty and you never gave me anything to drink; I was a stranger and you never made me welcome, naked and you never clothed me, sick and in prison and you never visited me." Then it will be their turn to ask, "Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty, a stranger or naked, sick or in prison, and did not come to your help?" Then he will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you neglected to do this to one of the least of these, you neglected to do it to me." And they will go away to eternal punishment, and the virtuous to eternal life.'

In today's Gospel, Jesus describes to his disciples the scene of the judgment of the Son of Man. All the nations will be assembled before him, and he will separate them as a shepherd separates sheep and goats upon their return from the pasture. The judgments made by the Son of Man will be based upon the acts of mercy shown to the least ones—the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the ill, and the imprisoned. Last week's parable of the talents taught us that the gifts that we have been given are intended to be used for the service of others, especially the least among us. Our judgment before God will be based not only on how we have used these gifts and talents, but also on how we have extended ourselves in service to these least ones.

This weekend with your family...

Jesus teaches us that we will be judged on only one thing: the acts of mercy we have shown to the least among us. Jesus identifies with the least ones; thus we serve Jesus whenever we serve one of the least ones. We might like to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to bury the dead, to shelter the homeless, to visit the sick and imprisoned, and to give alms to the poor. In these actions we show God's compassion and mercy to those in need. Talk about some concrete examples of how your family might do these actions in your community and then discuss why it is important that we do these things.

RELIGIOUS LITERACY ASSESSMENT RESULTS 2014

As part of a Parramatta Diocesan wide assessment of religious literacy, all Year 4 and Year 6 students completed a Part A online assessment in August/September. The students answered 35 multiple choice questions that were drawn from the seven strands of *Sharing Our Story*: God, Jesus, Church, Scripture, Prayer, Sacraments and Christian Life. The questions related to their learning in Religious Education up to and including Year 4 or Year 6. While the questions were not the same for each student, the assessment was of equal difficulty overall.

In addition to the Part A Online Test, Year 4 students chose how they would demonstrate their learning in relation to the *Sharing Our Story* unit, 24C9 Reconciliation: God's Forgiveness and Healing as they undertook the Part B Extended Task. The Part B Task was marked locally by teachers in our school.

The children in our school performed very well in relation to the Diocesan results. Our average results were higher than the Diocesan average. Many children in our school achieved 100% in one or more of the seven strands of the Sharing Our Story Religious Education curriculum. Each child's results will be sent home in a report with the end of year reports.

We are extremely proud of the achievements of all the children who completed the Religious Literacy Assessment and will continue to provide Quality Catholic Schooling for your child in partnership with you. Thank you to the Year 4 and Year 6 teachers for all of their hard work in preparing the students for this assessment.

Swimming Programme Commences Next Week for Kindergarten & Year 3

The students will need to wear their swimmers underneath their school uniform (they are allowed to wear their sport uniform each day for swimming) and will need to bring the following items with them each day:-

- Thongs or sandals to change into and wear to and from the pool
- Towel
- Underwear
- T-shirt or jacket to wear to and from the pool
- Goggles optional (these MUST be labelled)
- Swimming cap optional. The students must have their hair tied back if it is long enough to cover their eyes when wet, otherwise the swim school recommends that parents provide a labelled swim cap.
- Please note: rash vests are **not** to be worn as it is an indoor pool.

Please make sure that **everything** is labelled and that your child recognises what he/she is bringing to school. Please understand that it is the children's responsibility to look after their own belongings.

Christmas Choir



Year 4 iLearn Program

This week, Year 4 had some special visitors to their classroom. Three teachers from St Joseph's Primary School, Schofields and members of the iLearn program visited our classroom to see the wonderful things we have been doing with our iPads. We showed them what we have been working on in Science for our PBL (Project Based Learning) on mini worlds. During the visit, we showed them some of the Google Docs we have created that show our new knowledge and scripts we developed to help us during the filming of our documentary. The students articulated their thinking and the processes they have used confidently and explained the purpose of the task and intended audience. It was a great opportunity to see others how we have been using our iPads to benefit our learning.

Here are two students' views from the experience:

On Wednesday my PBL group were asked some questions about our documentary and we answered them confidently and in detail. These questions included How did you do this? What are you doing it on? This was some of the questions asked about our group and it was fun. They filmed us while we were filming and doing our work. We all answered questions equally and we were exited.



My group and I were all doing equal amount of work and we all shared our ideas about each other's ideas and comments about the film that we had done. E.g. Was there to much sun or face in the video. We all contributed to each other and agreed and disagreed about ideas. The CEO and St. Joseph's teachers told us ways to edit and do our work more effectively and we took the feedback and it helped us.

This was a great learning curve because it helped my group and we are going to follow the instructions.
