Today was also the day for supporting the fundraiser to refurbish the Parents' Retreat at Westmead Hospital.



Gospel Reflection (Jn 4:5-15, 19-26, 39-42)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

The water that I shall give will turn into a spring of eternal life.

Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When

a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food.

The Samaritan woman said to him, 'What? You are a Jew and you ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' – Jews, in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

'If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you: Give me a drink,



you would have been the one to ask, and he would have given you living water.'

You have no bucket, sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could you get this living water? Are you a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:



'Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again:

but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.'

'Sir,' said the woman, 'give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty and never have to come here again to draw water. I see you are a prophet, sir. Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, while you say that Jerusalem is the place where one ought to worship.' Jesus said:

'Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we do know; for salvation comes from the Jews.

But the hour will come – in fact it is here already – when true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth: that is the kind of worshipper the Father wants. God is spirit, and those who worship must worship in spirit and truth.'

The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah – that is, Christ – is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.' 'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in him on the strength of the woman's testimony, so, when the Samaritans came up to him, they begged him to stay with them. He stayed for two days, and when he spoke to them many more came to believe; and they said to the woman, 'Now we no longer believe because of what you told us; we have heard him ourselves and we know that he really is the saviour of the world.' Reflection

The Samaritan woman's personal encounter with Jesus compels her to start spreading the good news about the amazing man she has met. She meets Jesus face to face and feels compelled to act on what she has felt. Lent is a time for each of us to again – or for the first time – seek out a face to face encounter with Jesus. Through prayer, contemplation on scripture or reflection on encountering Jesus in the face of others, we build a one to one relationship with Jesus. When we acknowledge this relationship, like the Samaritan woman, we are compelled to act on it.

Helping Children Understand Place Value

Children's understanding of Place Value is crucial to their success in all aspects of numeracy. Children need to understand that the value of a digit changes in quantity depending on where it is situated within a numeral. For example the digit '2' in the number 32 gives the digit '2' a ones value meaning 'two'. However the digit '2' in the number 324 changes the value of the '2' to 'twenty' and in the number 243 the digit '2' now changes to the value of 'two hundred'.

The language that we use as adults when teaching students is crucial in developing children's understandings of Place Value. In fact, at times our language is the reason for students misconceptions around Place Value.

We need to ensure that we don't define numbers according to their Place Value column rather than their quantity. For example: the number 5234 does NOT contain 2 hundreds, 3 tens and 4 ones. In actual fact, it contains 5 thousands, 52 hundreds, 523 tens and 5234 ones. This understanding is crucial when developing number concepts, especially larger numbers.

In the early years, concrete material such as MAB blocks are used to illustrate these concepts, but eventually we want students to visualise the above concept.

So what can you do at home? Talk about numbers! More specifically talk about the quantity of numbers and the value of digits within a number. Refrain from referring to digits purely based around their position within the Place Value column. Refer to numbers such as 356 as 'three hundreds' '35 tens' and '356 ones'. This will help develop their understanding of the quantity of larger numbers and develop their mental strategies when solving more complex questions.

Literacy News

Helping Your Child with Spelling:

Spelling is just a small piece of the puzzle with regards to writing. Ways to use the spelling lists to increase vocabulary and improve grammar are:

 \Box Have your children write the opposite (antonym) of each spelling word. Help them find the antonym if they don't know it at first.

□ Have your children write a synonym (a word with a similar meaning) for each spelling word.

□ Have them make the plural for each of the nouns on the list.

□ Have them add prefixes (un-, in-, re-, pre-, im-, etc.) or suffixes (s, es, er, ed, est, ing, etc.) to words when possible (the new word must still be a real word.) Talk about how this changes the word, and/or its meaning. (For example, if the original spelling word is "possible" adding "im" to the word makes it "impossible" - the complete opposite in meaning.)

From the office.....

School Fees – Term 1 school fees are now due and payable. Reminders will be sent out next week. If you need to discuss any aspect of the fees, please do not hesitate to contact Mrs Goldsworthy.

Absent Notes – If your child is away for any reason, an absent note must be sent to school on their return. This can be done either in writing to the teacher, by email to <u>ola@parra.catholic.edu.au</u> or by the skoolbag.app. It is a government requirement that the reason must be specific, not just family reasons, or family commitments.

Family Leave – If your child is going to be away for 10 days or more, then you need to complete an Application for Exemption form which needs to be submitted to the office, with a copy of your travel documents (eg flight details) and a Certificate of Exemption will be sent home to you. If it is less than 10 days, then a letter prior to leaving to the office/teacher needs to be sent in with the respective dates. Thank you for your attention to this matter.

Withdrawal from School – It is part of the CEDP Policy that a term's notice in writing must be given to the principal before the removal of a student or a full term's fees will be payable. Please give as much notice as possible to avoid being charged.

Early Collection from School – If you need to collect your child early from school, please <u>DO NOT</u> ring the office and ask us to have them here waiting for you. We will only call for the children once you have arrived.

Book Covering – With the new library nearly completed, we have a lot of readers to be covered. If you can assist with this (contact is provided), please call into the office to pick up a bag of books.

Winter Uniform – Just for the new families at school, the students will go into their winter uniform in Term 2, <u>Week 4, Monday 15th May 2017</u>. Winter uniform will be available in the uniform shop towards the end of this term.

Kindergarten Siblings 2018 – If you have a child due to start kindergarten next year, please email the office with your child's name, DOB and the sibling's class and we will arrange for enrolment forms to be sent home to you in the next few weeks.

Parent/Teacher/Student Conferences will take place in week 10, beginning on Monday 27th March.

PBS4L: Postive Behaviour Support for Learning

Our focus at school for the next two weeks will be the expectation that everyone outdoors will be wearing a hat. 
From the Classroom..... of 4W
