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



Dear Parents,

What is a Sacrament? The Catholic Church teaches that the sacraments are "efficacious signs of grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church, by which divine life is dispensed to us. The visible rites by which the sacraments are celebrated signify and make present the graces proper to each sacrament.



The Ten Commandments were given to Moses and God's people thousands of years before Christ. However, during His time on earth, Christ brought them into the context of the New Testament, specifically the third commandment, *Keep Holy the Sabbath Day*. This commandment mandates us to give one hour, from sunset Saturday to sunset on Sunday, to God by attending Mass. The Eucharist is central to our relationship with Christ. It is through this Sacrament that we receive the grace of God and become more



QUALITY CATHOLIC SCHOOLING SURVEY

All Catholic schools in the Diocese of Parramatta will be participating in the Quality Catholic Schooling (OCS) project in 2017.

QCS will provide data from students, staff and parents about our school's cultural behaviour, relationships and learning community and will assist us to focus our efforts for improvement by building on our successes to date.

From 20-31 March all staff, approximately 120 students from Years 3, 4, 5 and 6, and 60 randomly-selected parents will be asked to complete an online survey. Staff and students will complete the survey online at school. Parents have been sent home a paper survey but will also be able to complete the survey online if preferred. The survey will take about 20 minutes to complete.

A survey consultant (Insight SRC) has been engaged to manage the data collection. The survey data will be kept strictly confidential and no individual will be identified to the school or the Catholic Education Office. Each school will receive an information report at the end of May and will use this report to inform their planning.

If you have been selected to complete the survey, I would encourage your participation as this will help our school to identify our strengths and areas in which we can focus our improvement. If you have any questions, please contact the school.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

The blind man went off and washed himself and came away with his sight restored.

As Jesus went along, he saw a man who had been blind from birth. He spat on the ground, made a paste with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man and said to him, 'Go and wash in the Pool of Siloam' (a name that means 'sent'). So the blind man went off and washed himself, and came away with his sight restored.

His neighbours and people who earlier had seen him begging said, 'Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?' Some said, 'Yes, it is the same one.' Others said, 'No, he only looks like him.' The man himself said, 'I am the man.'

They brought the man who had been blind to the Pharisees. It had been a Sabbath day when Jesus made the paste and opened the man's eyes, so when the Pharisees asked him how he had come to see, he said, 'He put a paste on my eyes, and I washed, and I can see.' Then some of the Pharisees said, 'This man cannot be from God: he does not keep the Sabbath.' Others said, 'How could a sinner produce signs like this?' And there was disagreement among them. So they spoke to the blind man again, 'What have you to say about him yourself, now that he has opened your eyes?' 'He is a prophet' replied the man.

'Are you trying to teach us,' they replied 'and you a sinner through and through, since you were born!' And they drove him away.

Jesus heard they had driven him away, and when he found him he said to him, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' 'Sir,' the man replied 'tell me who he is so that I may believe in him.' Jesus said, 'You are looking at him; he is speaking to you.' The man said, 'Lord, I believe', and worshipped him.

Gospel Reflection

The story of the man born blind is a perfect choice for the Lenten season. During this season we are invited once again to open our eyes to Jesus; to step out of darkness and into the light; to look towards the future with hope and not despair. When we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus at the Easter vigil, we celebrate the coming of the Light of the World into our lives. This annual call to turn away from darkness and walk in the light is a powerful and poetic call to focus our lives on the way of Jesus.

From the Assistant Principal...

On Monday four staff members attended a professional learning day focused on teaching numeracy in the classroom. In the coming weeks, more OLA teachers will attend these sessions, facilitated by teacher educators from Diocese of Parramatta. These sessions unpacked what the 'numeracy block' (1 hour maths lesson each day) should look like, and teachers work shopped numerous games/activities and warm ups to facilitate deep reasoning skills, in line with our schools goal for the year.

The following is a reflection from some of our Year 3 teachers who attended the day last Monday.

"On Monday, Mrs Cheadle and myself attended a Professional Learning day on Mathematics in Years 3-6. We learnt so much and we were eager to implement our learning the next day in class. One important thing we learnt was changing our mindsets. Mathematics can sometimes be seen as challenging and this can impede us from wanting to learn more and, to at times, give up.

The concept of having a 'Growth Mindset' is crucial in any new learning but particularly in mathematics. Children will often comment, "I'm not good at mathematics", "I cant do maths!", 'maths is always hard!". Sometimes this attitude is being reinforced at home when parents say, "I was never good at maths either!". Research has proven that having a 'growth mindset' goes a long way to achieving success. Changing the mindset from 'I cant' to 'I can with help...' is crucial. I hope that you take the time to watch the above video.

Literacy News

Helping Your Child with Spelling:

- Help your child write the spelling words on a separate piece of paper in alphabetical order.
- Have your children draw pictures for each of the spelling words. Have them write the word below the picture. Take all the pictures and create a spelling reference book over the course of the year.
- Create a word search with your child's spelling words. You can do this by making a grid of 10 squares by 10 squares, writing the spelling words in the grid, then filling up the other squares with random letters. Keep a list of your children's spelling words nearby for them to reference while doing the word search.
- Together, think of ways to remember the words. For example, *You HEAR with your EAR; He will be a FRIEND until the END; The ELEPHANT ate an ANT, that is why he has an ANT in him.* These types of memorization tricks are called *mnemonics.*
- Have your children write a story using as many of their spelling words as possible. Have them illustrate their stories.
- Make a concentration game out of the spelling words and play this game with your children.
- Dictate the words and their spellings onto an electronic device. Find moments for your children to listen to the recording such as in the car or for a few minutes before bedtime. Or, help your children make their own recordings.



Book Covering – With the new library nearly completed, we have a lot of readers to be covered. If you can assist with this (contact is provided), please call into the office to pick up a bag of books.




