Dear Parents,

It is not uncommon for parents ask if a school offers a 'Gifted and Talented Program'. In my previous role as Assistant Principal and many other hats including Yr 6 teacher, I was fortunate to be chosen among 45 schools in the inner west region of Sydney to trial Lego Robotics to support learning. I needed to make a decision around which students would be targeted to implement this trial. I decided not to be selective but rather include all students in my class. Interestingly, half the students identified as 'gifted' showed little interest or flair. More importantly, among the students that would have been excluded were those that embraced and extended the program the most. Lesson? We know God has blessed us all with our own talents. All children need to be exposed to a wide range of learning experiences allowing them the opportunities present in the Early Learning in Kinder, Discovery Time in the infants grades and PBL in the older grades. These present opportunities to take their learning further through questioning, collaboration, critical thinking, cooperation and tapping into their creativity to present their findings.

Spelling Bee.

This week we held the inaugural OLA Spelling Bee. When this idea was raised early in the year, I never imagined it would create such a buzz (pardon the pun) with teachers and students embracing it with great enthusiasm. It was certainly an exhibition of the talent in this area that exists among our students. Congratulations to all the students on their participation, to the 12 finalists, but especially our school champion, James Apap (Y3), 2nd Place winner Julia Zammit (Yr3) and 3rd place Matthew Diesto (Y5). It was a long and very close competition, testament to the spelling skills of these students. Special thanks to Mrs Hurst who organised and drove the event and to all the teachers who assisted.

End of Year Christmas Event.

Those of you who have been at OLA for some years will be familiar with the social gathering before the Christmas Concert. SUNDAY 26th NOVEMBER 2017: OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE GOSPEL REFLECTION

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

He will take his seat on his throne of glory, and he will separate men one from another.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, escorted by all the angels, and then he will take his seat on his throne of glory. All the nations will be assembled before him and he will separate men one from another as the shepherd separates sheep from goats. He will place the sheep on his right

hand and the goats on his left. Then the King will say to those on his right hand, "Come, you whom my Father has blessed, take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you made me welcome; naked and you clothed me, sick and you visited me, in prison and you came to see me." Then the virtuous will say to him in reply, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you; or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and make you welcome; naked and clothe you; sick or in prison and go to see you?" And the King will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you did this to one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it to me." Next he will say to those on his left hand, "Go away from me, with your curse upon you, to the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you never gave me food; I was thirsty and you never gave me anything to drink; I was a stranger and you never made me



welcome, naked and you never clothed me, sick and in prison and you never visited me." Then it will be their turn to ask, "Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty, a stranger or naked, sick or in prison, and did not come to your help?" Then he will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you neglected to do this to one of the least of these, you neglected to do it to me." And they will go away to eternal punishment, and the virtuous to eternal life.'

Gospel Reflection

The eternal destiny of every human being of a certain maturity is determined by decisions made in relation to food and drink for the famished, clothing and housing for those without decent clothing or shelter, visiting those in circumstances which cut them off from life-giving contact with others (the sick and prisoners). Those who provide such assistance, in the words of Pope Francis, touch the wounds of Christ! A Christian can be fully conscious of this, but for non-Christians it is possible to do so without any of our awareness or belief. Christ is *completely* incognito to them: 'When did we ever see you hungry and feed you ...'. We know the doctrine of the Real Presence in the poor and marginalised. Woe betides those of us who ignore this fact of faith. We are on the way to a Hellish state of existence. That is equally possible for those who do not share our faith, but who ignore the plight of the marginalised and continue in a self-absorbed way. We could pause for a moment to pray that we, and many billions of non-Christians, may hear the invitation: 'Come you blessed of my Father, inherit the Kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world.'

From the Classroom of 1G

In 1G this week we have been learning about Volume and Capacity in Mathematics. The students were set the challenge to measure the volume of three-dimensional shapes in teams. They had to choose which unit of measurement to use from the mathematics resources and ensure that they measured the inside space otherwise known as the volume of the shape together. They knew from their prior knowledge that to measure accurately there needed to be no gaps and no overlaps when measuring with the informal units.

Some students chose unifix cubes and other students chose MAB ones to measure their shapes. One of the groups received a tea cup shape to measure the volume of. The students realised through trial and error that a curved three-dimensional shape cannot be measure with the same units as the other rectangular prisms could. This was because when using the units chosen there WERE gaps and overlaps. We discovered in order to measure a curved three-dimensional shape accurately we would need another method, CAPACITY!.

Swim Program starts next week for Kindergarten & Year 4

A few points to remember about our swim program which will start next week:-

- Swimming will be on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.
- It is a two week program.
- Students can wear their sport clothes on the days they go swimming for ease of getting changed.
- They are to wear their swimmers underneath their sport clothes.
- It is advisable for the girls to wear a one-piece swim suit.
- They need to bring:-
 - Thongs/sandals to wear to and from the pool
 - Towel
 - Change of underwear
 - T-shirt/jacket to wear to and from the pool
 - Rash vests are NOT to be worn as it is an indoor pool.
 - NO parents are to attend the swimming centre during the swim program.

Please make sure that everything is labelled and that your child recognises what he/she is bringing to school. Please understand that it is the children's responsibility to look after their own belongings.
