## Gospel Reflection Sunday 4th February (5th Sunday of Ordinary Time)

#### A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark (Mk 1:29-39)

He cured many who suffered from diseases of one kind or another.

On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straight away. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.



That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

#### **Gospel Reflection**

The Gospel of Mark offers hope in the face of human afflictions, as Jesus heals sick people and expels demons. Proclaiming the Gospel in word and action exhausts the body and spirit, so Jesus retreats to spend time in prayer. In doing so, he finds new vigour and strength to continue his mission of proclaiming the Good News.

#### Applying the Gospel to our own lives

In the midst of an extremely hectic 24 hours where Jesus effectively launches his public ministry, Jesus takes time to go aside to a lonely place and pray. The passage tells us that it was 'long before dawn' that he did this. It may have been his usual practice to pray early in the morning or he may have been restless after the events of the previous day and the thought of what lay ahead. Nevertheless, Jesus provides us with a model of using prayer to reflect on events and to prepare ourselves for the day ahead. Take time each day to pray. Prayer can be simple, it is a time where we are still and silent. Take time to think of people who need your prayers, think of people you can lean on in times of despair, discouragement and hopelessness.

H = those we can go to help us when we are in trouble.

- O = those who are open to us when we need to talk.
- P = those we can pray with and share our faith.
- $\mathsf{E}$  = those who encourage us and support us to keep going.



With some 40 million men, women and children trapped in slavery globally, we are now living in a world in which more people are trapped and traded than were bought and sold during the entire Trans-Atlantic slave trade. Of these enslaved millions, one quarter are kids. We can all contribute to ending slavery and Catholic schools

have a central role to play. Pope Francis is calling all of us to join to end slavery and in Australia this campaign is being coordinated by the Anti-Slavery Taskforce in Sydney.

Please join us in prayer for the eradication of modern slavery and human trafficking.

#### Convict letter written by Bella Molano

January 5th, 1842

Dear Governor Phillip,

I am writing this letter to ask you to pardon me. As you may already know my name is Jane Robertson and I am a convict who was on the ship called Rajah. The crime I have committed is theft; I stole 2 loaves of bread from a wealthy family.

I am very and truly sorry for committing my crime. My family is very poor and we really needed the food. I have a family of 5 and my parents really struggle to look after us. I have been on in jail for a year now, and I have learnt how to knit clothes, and I am very good at it. Maybe if I can be let free I can knit clothes for your soldiers and their families. For what I have been through so far, I will not steal food or do any crime again.

I will work hard for my family and make money so I do not have to steal from wealthy families. So, please Governor Phillip, please let me be pardoned.

#### Skoolbag App

Our Skoolbag app is a way of informing you of upcoming events or cancellation due to the weather, results from carnivals and gala days, giving updates while students are on excursions and other important information about major events within the school.

We have a large portion of the school already using this app.

If you do not have the app it is free to download. To install it, just search for our school name "Our Lady of the Angels Primary Rouse Hill" in either the Apple App Store, or Google Play Store.

There are many benefits to having this app on your device:

- You may select to receive notification for your child's grade only.
- Absentee notes can be completed on this app.
- Access to newsletters and news events linked directly to our school website. •
- Instant notification when excursions are postponed, assemblies cancelled due to bad weather, delays during excursions and other important information.
- Online permission notes in the future. •

If you already have this app, it is up to you to update your settings to receive the correct push notifications. To update this click the "More" button on the bottom right of the app, then "Setup Push Notifications". Turn on the Push categories that are applicable for you by tapping the on/off switch. You will receive alerts specific to the selected grade and all alerts sent as a whole school.

In Parent Notes you will find an up to date school uniform list, medication notes and leave of exemption forms. Throughout the year, it will be updated as needed with excursion notes, sporting notes and special event notes.

#### Our School is a Nut Aware School Community

At Our Lady of the Angels School, we have children who have severe allergies to nuts. While allergic reactions are common and most are not serious, for these children the reaction can be life-threatening. This is called anaphylaxis and can occur in minutes of an exposure to a trigger, in these children's case, nuts.

We see prevention as a major part of providing a safe environment for these children. So as to support our community's effort in this regard, we kindly ask that parents avoid preparing snacks for recess or lunch that include Nutella spread, any peanut butter, nut spreads, snack bars and biscuits that contain nuts. Products having the statement may contain 'traces of nuts' are suitable to bring to school.

We also ask that you **do not** include foods that contain nuts when providing food for special events such as cake days or morning teas.



#### PBS4L - Positive Behaviour Support for Learning

Our Lady of the Angels school has implemented a framework called PBS4L. The framework establishes common expectations for all - teachers, parents and students - treating all with respect.

PBS4L follows our school rules: Respect for self

Respect for others Respect for environment

The purpose of the framework is:

- o to reduce behavioural problems in a proactive way and therefore increase time for instruction and learning
- o to help all students feel connected to the whole school community
- o to increase wellbeing
- o to reduce absenteeism
- o to create a positive school climate
- o to maximise learning

Teachers have created lessons to teach the children the behaviour expectations in all settings across the school.
