Dear Parents,

Last Sunday marked the end of the Liturgical Year with the *Feast of Christ the King*. The following is from the homilies by Fater Kevin O'Shea CSSR...

"Kingship originated some 5,000 years ago. It goes back to two places, where human culture began. One is ancient Sumer. It is the name of the marshes of southern Iraq. There the rivers Tigris and Euphrates converge, before they flow into the Persian Gulf. The other place is ancient Egypt. It is on the banks of the river Nile. Civilisation came by riverside. It was in these places that cities were built. They were open to attack and needed people to defend them. They needed armies, with leaders. The leaders were called kings. Kings were needed to win battles against enemies, and so protect the local culture. They were usually commanders in chief of the military. In the Jewish tradition, the king is King David. Jesus is the true David, so we call him Christ the King.

*So, are we right in calling Jesus a King? You could say that Jesus fights evil and wins, that he rescues us from sin and death and raises us up. You could say that he has prepared a place, a paradise for us. We are used to saying these things. We are used to calling him Christ the King. But we ought to **pause and look** at what we mean....*

*None of the ancient images we have of him shows anyone crouching and humbled at his feet. He isn't from the upper-class urban elite, and he has no army. Instead – **he forgives, he acquits, he shows mercy, he bestows. He loves his enemies. He loves the unlovely. He loves the other.** He claims by preference those who have been made to cringe at someone's feet. If it is right to call him king, it is by using the word king in a sense that is the exact opposite of its native meaning.*

It may be the feast of Christ the King, but it is also the feast of all those he has made kingly - all those who can and do forgive and recognise and love one another. But among them, Jesus is the firstborn, the firstborn of all creation, the firstborn from the dead. They are not dead anymore."

We often hear the term 'the Kingdom of God' or, more recently, 'the Reign of God'. Through Baptism, we are born into God's Kingdom, the purpose of which is to build a world of love and justice. We do this by recognising Jesus in ourselves and in each other.


Sunday, 2nd December

First Sunday of Advent Year C

(Lk 21:25-28, 34-36)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke
Your redemption is near at hand.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There will be signs in the sun and moon and stars; on earth nations in agony, bewildered by the clamour of the ocean and its waves; men dying of fear as they await what menaces the world, for the powers of heaven will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. When these things begin to take place, stand erect, hold your heads high, because your liberation is near at hand. 'Watch yourselves, or your hearts will be coarsened with debauchery and drunkenness and the cares of life, and that day will be sprung on you suddenly, like a trap. For it will come down on every living man on the face of the earth. Stay awake, praying at all times for the strength to survive all that is going to happen, and to stand with confidence before the Son of Man.'



Gospel Reflection

The readings of the First Sunday of Advent set the stages for our reflections on the entire season. They contain a number of promises, all pointing to peace and fulfilment. Each reading depicts a dimension of suffering that was often brought on by the people themselves. The promises are assurances that the end of their suffering was in sight. The promises reveal a loving and provident, a merciful and forgiving God. These are promises full of hope. The coming of the Lord is clearly a time of expectation, not of fear and trembling. Although the earlier tradition about the Day of the Lord included punishment of the wicked, the focus here is on redemption. The time of expectation may be preceded by apocalyptic signs in the heavens and dismay on earth, but this cosmic shift will bring fulfilment, not destruction. The love and providence, the mercy and forgiveness of God will be made manifest. What is expected of those who receive the promise? An Advent way of life exhorts us to 'wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Saviour Jesus Christ'. This way of life is both simple and profound. It does not necessarily require unusual behaviour on our part, but it calls us to live the usual unusually well. It affects the everyday events of life; it directs the way we interact with people; it informs the attitudes that colour our judgments and motivations. It is as ordinary as the birth of a child; it is as extraordinary as the revelation of God. (LiturgyHelp.com, Dianne Bergant)

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Afternoon Pick Up

As you know the afternoon drive through/pick up between 3.00 and 3.40pm is very congested. The school has procedures in place which aim to reduce the congestion however parents often vent their frustrations about other parents not following the school pick up arrangements.

Please adhere to the following pick up arrangements:

- The entrance to the driveway should not be blocked. We have had complaints that cars are waiting at the entrance to the driveway or entering the driveway and waiting until 3.10pm when they can then pick up children from Years 1-6. This then creates a queue along Wellgate Avenue because the Kindergarten parents can't get in.
- If your child is in Year 1-6 or an older sibling of a kindergarten student, unless you are parking your car and picking up your child please do not enter the carpark and join the queue.
 - If your OLDEST child is in KINDERGARTEN, your pickup time is 3PM.
 - **NO OTHER PARENTS SHOULD BE ARRIVING BEFORE 3.10pm.**
 - If your **oldest** child is in Year 1 or Year 2, please pick up from 3.10pm
 - If your **oldest** child is in Year 3 or Year 4, please pick up from 3.20pm
 - If your **oldest** child in in Year 5 or Year 6, please pick up from 3.30pm.
 - All younger siblings will wait with the oldest sibling, under teacher supervision

Swimming Carnival - 12th December



CPR & LIFE SAVING

On Thursday the 8th of September, Year 5 and 6 participated in a Life Saving course. We started off by watching a PowerPoint presentation on CPR and other important information that we might need one day.

After the presentation, we were split into 3 groups and separated to do more activities. The activities were helping someone drowning, practicing CPR on dummies and creating a brochure for foreigners about water safety in Australia. The first activity I did was helping someone drowning. We had to throw out multiple objects to the person 'drowning' and gave them instructions to use it to get to safety.

The next activity was practicing CPR on the dummies. We learnt about the acronym 'DRSABCD' which stands for Danger, Response, Send for help, Airway, Breathing, CPR and Defibrillation. These are crucial steps to follow when doing CPR. We also learnt how to do the compressions and mouth to mouth (30 compressions and 2 breaths.)

The last activity we did was creating a brochure for foreigners about water safety in Australia. We were first given worksheets to do on what we learnt then we created the brochures. We had to explain what safety precautions to take when near water.

We finished the day by watching a video of Mr Bean failing at CPR and had to point out what was wrong that he did.
