

"Blessed are the merciful, for mercy they will find".

Dear Parents,

It is human nature to have preconceived ideas of the world around us and the people who live in it. These 'world views' are influenced by our past experiences – what we hear, see, read about etc. I know I am guilty of generalising (my children tell me so ☹).

Have you ever stopped to think of what others' views are of 'Catholics'? That's us – you and me. This came to my attention during the homily at a Sunday Mass I attended at Sacred Heart Church in Morningside Heights, an area of New York City. The priest raised the question about others' world view of Catholics. He proposed the idea that, generally, Catholics are viewed those that 'don't allow this' and 'don't allow that'. How can we change this view to be a people that 'do' rather than 'don't'?

The Hebrew Scriptures in the Old Testament preach loving your neighbour. In John's Gospel, we read about Jesus telling His disciples, *'A new commandment I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so also you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you love one another.'* (John 13: 34-35). Many of us have sung the popular hymn, 'They will know we are Christians by our love'. Jesus' new commandment challenges us to love all people, not just our neighbour. I ask myself what I can do to ensure that 'others' see Catholics as people of love are caring and considerate. I pose the same question to members of my school community, more importantly, what can I *do* to help you. Let us work together so that others will know we are Christians by our love for one another.



"Sacred Heart of Jesus, I place my trust in thee."

Along this same theme, today is the Feast of the Sacred Heart, a movable feast. Having grown up in and received all sacraments in Sacred Heart Parish, I have particular devotion to and great faith in the Sacred Heart. Remember to pray and place your trust in God's hands and have faith in His plan for us, especially when 'things go wrong'.

Winter has arrived.

This week we felt the arrival of cold weather – at last. It certainly was hard to get out of a warm bed and get to work on time. Quite a number of staff members, in fact arrived late for work, around 9.15am or so. When questioned their response was, 'Oh, it was cold and it was just too hard to get out of bed'. What should I say? What would your boss say if you were late for work and that was the reason, day after day?

None of this is true, of course. However it is true of many of our students and the excuse given by parents. School is a training ground, preparing young people for the 'grown up world'. It is parents' responsibility to be the parents. Insist that your children are up and ready and at school on time.

Only 64 children out of 475 have been on time for school every day this year. DO NOT allow for television or iPad or PC, or any other distractions in the morning. You are the parent. Please do the parenting. It is your responsibility and your child/ren will thank you.

Speaking of cold weather, there are many people who do not have the comfort of a roof over their head or a warm bed. Many are in our own neighbourhood. Thank you to Mrs Byrne (acting REC) and the Mini-Vinnies students for organising pyjama day and highlighting the plight of others. Thank you to all of you who donated warm bedding etc. Members of this school community are known for their generosity and the Vinnies men were astounded at the amount and good quality of your donations. Your actions means there will be many people a whole lot warmer this winter. Thank you.

Gospel according to Luke 7:11-17

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Young man, I say to you arise.

Jesus went to a town called Nain, accompanied by his disciples and a great number of people. When he was near the gate of the town it happened that a dead man was being carried out for burial, the only son of his mother, and she was a widow. And a considerable number of the townspeople were with her. When the Lord saw her he felt sorry for her. 'Do not cry,' he said. Then he went up and put his hand on the bier and the bearers stood still, and he said, 'Young man, I tell you to get up'. And the dead man sat up and began to talk, and Jesus gave him to his mother. Everyone was filled with awe and praised God saying, 'A great prophet has appeared among us; God has visited his people.' And this opinion of him spread throughout Judaea and all over the countryside.



Reflection

This Sunday's Gospel according to Luke, Jesus is helping those in need as He resurrects the young man. This miracle was witnessed by many people and they in return spread the Good News about Jesus. Jesus saw a need and felt empathy for the mother and in return helped her. We are able to live Luke's Gospel through our willingness to help those who are vulnerable around us. We can help those who are denied basic necessities, like food, shelter and love. It is our compassion to others and our capacity to restore someone to life in the way Jesus restored the life of the widow. In life, we will encounter those who have been cast out by life circumstances or by the cruel actions of others and we have the opportunity to restore them to a fuller life throughout actions. We restore life when we restore dignity; when we refuse to participate in crushing someone down and instead extend a hand to help them up. (Liturgy Help-Homilies and Reflections © Greg Sunter)

Introducing the School Opal card

The School Opal card gives eligible students free or discounted travel between home and school using the train, bus, ferry and light rail services you nominate in your application.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for a School Opal card, students may need to live a minimum distance from their school:

- Years K-2 (Infants)
There's no minimum distance.
- Years 3-6 (Primary)
1.6km straight line distance or 2.3km walking.
- Years 7-12 (Secondary)
2.0km straight line distance or 2.9km walking.

Who needs to apply

A new application is only required if the student has not had a School Opal card before.

Parents whose children already have a School Opal card and are changing schools or campuses will need to update their Opal card for the new school year before mid-December at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/sts.

How to apply

Applications for 2017 open at the start of Term 4, 2016.

Step 1

Once the new school has confirmed the student's enrolment, complete the application at transportsw.info/school-students

Step 2

Print, sign and date the completed application, then submit it to the student's new school for endorsement.

Step 3

The school then sends the endorsed application to Transport for NSW. Once approved, the School Opal card will be sent to the address provided on the application.



Better together

The School Opal card is only for travel to and from school. So it's a good idea to get a Child/Youth Opal card for travel after hours, on weekends or during school holidays.

Child/Youth Opal card benefits

- Concession fares across the Opal network
- Free travel after eight paid journeys each week*
- Set auto top up and link it to your credit or debit card so there's always enough value on the card to travel.

i If you live too close to be eligible for free travel, you may still qualify for a School Term Bus Pass, which offers travel on buses between home and school at a discounted rate for the whole school term.

i A parent or guardian must apply for students 15 years and under. Students 16 years and over must apply for themselves.

i Secondary students aged 16 and over can travel with a Child/Youth Opal card when carrying a NSW/ACT Senior Secondary Student Concession Card, available from school and TAFE offices.

* Excluding Sydney Airport station access fee.
