Gospel Reflection Sunday 18th February (First Sunday of Lent)



Gospel (Mk 1:12-15)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark *He was tempted by Satan, and the angels looked after him.* The Spirit drove Jesus out into the wilderness and he remained there for forty days, and was tempted by Satan. He was with the wild beasts, and the angels

looked after him.

After John had been arrested, Jesus went into Galilee. There he proclaimed the Good News from God. 'The time has come' he said 'and the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent, and believe the Good News.'

Gospel Reflection

In the gospel passage, we have a picture of Jesus preparing himself for his public ministry. He takes himself out into the wilderness, away from all that he has known until this time, to reflect on his life so far and this next vital stage that he is about to enter. In the wilderness, Jesus is tempted. He has to face his own doubts and demons before he sets off on the road of his public ministry. When he leaves the desert wilderness and enters back into Galilee he immediately begins to preach and, in the first words accredited to him in this gospel, Jesus announces that the kingdom of God is at hand and it's time to repent and believe. It's a call to open your eyes and get with the program!

Living the Gospel

Jesus' proclamation of the kingdom of God is a call to live out God's transformative dream of right relationship with one another and with our world. To accept this call requires a change of heart and mind and the adoption of a new orientation, a new worldview based on living the kingdom of God. This is a challenge to be counter-cultural – to go 'against the flow' of the majority attitudes at times. It is certainly not an 'easy option' that we are called to live. Jesus' call to 'repent and believe' is a very appropriate call to begin the Lenten season.

PARENT HELPERS???

It has been heartening to see how many of our parents, grandparents, etc, have completed the Child Protection Training in anticipation of helping out at school. Whenever this is done, the school is notified by email and the names added go on a register to which we refer when someone wants to come into the school. The list is growing, thank you.

This includes helping at school in areas such as gross motor, lunches, reading groups, etc.

This must be completed every 2 years.

How important is Counting in mathematical learning?

Before a child even begins Kindergarten, they will have experienced thousands of opportunities to encounter number, in particular, counting. The pre-school years offer many experiences and opportunities to use counting strategies to solve numerical problems that they are faced with. Counting forwards by ones, twos, fives and other multiples are strategies that are very helpful when adding and multiplying problems. Similarly, counting backwards is essential in the development of subtraction and division problems. Counting enables children to keep track of a quantity as they are increased or decreased. In the early years, children learn counting by rote. They learn the sequence of numbers, as if learning the alphabet. As they become more accomplished counters, they recognize a pattern, such as 'teens', and 'ty' to represent a new 'ten'. In the early years of primary school, the emphasis becomes on 'one to one' correspondence, (recognizing each number represents a quantity – evidenced by children touching and moving each object as they count.) As their understanding of counting develops children are then encouraged to begin counting from a number other than 'zero', count by numbers other than by ones, (eg. Skip counting forwards and backwards by 2s, 5s, 10s and then other combinations.) In upper primary, the counting is extended into rational number, (counting by halves, thirds, quarters, etc) It is important that children develop a thorough understanding of counting in order for them to be successful in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

Counting is the first domain tested during the Maths Assessment Interview (MAI). Below is a list of the counting growth points. Please note that the numbers **DO NOT** correspond with the year of schooling. In fact it is hoped that children in the middle years of primary school are moving towards numbers 5 and 6. Many children begin Kindergarten may already be able to do number 3 or 4.

Counting Growth Points

- 1. Rote count to 20
- 2. Counting Collections
- 3. Count by 1s, forwards and backwards, including various starting points and know one more/less.
- 4. Counting from 0 by 2s, 5s and 10s, including various starting points and know 2, 5, 10 more/less than a number. (without needing to count)
- 5. Counting from any given number by another number other than 1. Example counting by 3s, 4s, 7s, etc.
- 6. Can count forwards and backwards using fractions and decimals.

The importance of the MAI, is that it identifies to teachers which growth point the child is at, therefore allowing them to plan the learning experiences so that the child can reach the next milestone (growth Point)

Next week we will look at addition and subtraction!
