"There where you are, God is". St Mary of the Cross MacKillop

Dear Parents

Some of you might know the story about the man who climbs out onto the roof of his house to escape rising flood waters. A fellow in a row boat comes past and asks him to get in. The man acknowledges but refuses the offer with the words, "I'm OK. God will save me."

The waters continue to rise forcing him to the top of a chimney. A helicopter hovers and lowers a rope ladder to the man. Again, the man acknowledges but refuses the offer with the words, "I'm OK. God will save me."

The man drowns. He meets God and asks, "Why didn't You save me?" God replies, "I sent you a boat and a helicopter. You refused both." Hindsight is a wonderful thing. God is present in every moment of our life. However, we are not always open to recognising 'the signs' of His presence. Our faith requires us to remember all that comes our way – the good and the challenging - is part of God's saving plan for us. We often ask, "Why?' of God. Even Jesus asked His Father, 'Why have You forsaken Me?"

God's saving plan came to fruition with Christ's suffering, death and resurrection, the story that unfolds through Holy Week which begins this Palm Sunday. 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Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord (Mk 15:1-39) Sunday 25th March 2018

The passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark

First thing in the morning, the chief priests together with the elders and the scribes, in short the whole Sanhedrin, had their plan ready. They had Jesus bound and took him away and handed him over to Pilate.

Pilate questioned him, 'Are you the king of the Jews?' 'It is you who say it' he answered. And the chief priests brought many accusations against him. Pilate questioned him again, 'Have you no reply at all? See how many accusations they are bringing against you!' But to Pilate's amazement, Jesus made no further reply.

At festival time Pilate used to release a prisoner for them, anyone they asked for. Now a man called Barabbas was then in prison with the rioters who had committed murder during the uprising. When the crowd went up and began to ask Pilate the customary favour, Pilate answered them, 'Do you want me to release for you the king of the Jews?' For he realised it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed Jesus over. The chief priests, however, had incited the crowd to demand that he should release Barabbas for them instead. The Pilate spoke again. 'But in that case,' he said to them 'what am I to do with the man you call king of the Jews?' They shouted back, 'Crucify him!' 'Why?' Pilate asked them 'What harm has he done?' But they shouted all the louder, 'Crucify him!' So Pilate, anxious to placate the crowd, released Barabbas for them and, having ordered Jesus to be scourged, handed him over to be crucified.

The soldiers led him away to the inner part of the palace, that is, the Praetorium, and called the whole cohort together. They dressed him in purple, twisted some thorns into a crown and put it on him. And they began saluting him, 'Hail, king of the Jews!' They struck his head with a reed and spat on him; and they went down on their knees to do him homage. And when they had finished making fun of him, they took off the purple and dressed him in his own clothes.

They led him out to crucify him. They enlisted a passer-by, Simon of Cyrene, father of Alexander and <u>Rufus</u>, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross. They brought Jesus to the place called <u>Golgotha</u>, which means the place of the skull.

They offered him wine mixed with myrrh, but he refused it. Then they crucified him, and shared out his clothing, casting lots to decide what each should get. It was the third hour when they crucified him. The inscription giving the charge against him read: 'The King of the Jews.' And they crucified two robbers with him, one on his right and one on his left.

The passers-by jeered at him; they shook their heads and said, 'Aha! So you would destroy the Temple and rebuild it in three days! Then save yourself: come down from the cross!' The chief priests and the scribes mocked him among themselves in the same way. 'He saved others,' they said 'he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the king of Israel, come down from the cross now, for us to see it and believe.' Even those who were crucified with him taunted him. When the sixth hour came there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried out in a loud voice, 'Eloi, Eloi, Iama sabachthani?' which means, 'My God, my God, why have you deserted me?' When some of those who stood by heard this they said, 'Listen, he is calling on Elijah'. Someone ran and soaked a sponge in vinegar and, putting it on a reed, gave it him to drink saying, 'Wait and see if Elijah will come to take him down.' But Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

And the veil of the Temple was torn in two from top to bottom. The centurion, who was standing in front of him, had seen how he had died, and he said, 'In truth this man was a son of God.'

Gospel Reflection

As we enter into Holy Week, let us reflect on the suffering of Jesus and how he gave His life for us to save us from Original Sin. May we spend time praying for our family and friends, those in need who are lost, lonely and feel no love. May we take time over the next week to reach out to someone with an open heart and a helping hand.

Helping Your Child with Spelling:

Spelling is just a small piece of the puzzle with regards to writing. Ways to use the spelling lists to increase vocabulary and improve grammar are:

☐ Have your children write the opposite (antonym) of each spelling word. Help them find the antonym if they don't know it at first.

☐ Have your children write a synonym (a word with a similar meaning) for each spelling word.

☐ Have them make the plural for each of the nouns on the list.

☐ Have them add prefixes (un-, in-, re-, pre-, im-, etc.) or suffixes (s, es, er, ed, est, ing, etc.) to words when possible (the new word must still be a real word.) Talk about how this changes the word, and/or its meaning. (For example, if the original spelling word is "possible" adding "im" to the word makes it "impossible" - the complete opposite in meaning.)
