School Resumes Term 4 Assembly: Yr 1 Verse Speaking 1



God speaks to us in many ways, including through the Sunday Scripture readings. We hear The Word and are given messages to to help us show the face of God.

Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time-22nd September 2019 (Lk 16: 1-13)

Jesus said, "The one who is honest in small things, will be honest in great. The one who is dishonest in small things will be dishonest in great. If you cannot be trusted with money, who will trust you with genuine riches?" **Gospel Reflection-Reversal of Fortunes (LiturgyHelp.com-Fr Michael Tate)**

Jesus, surprisingly, found something appealing about this steward who was in the rapacious lending business. What was it? Faced with the news that he was about to lose his position, his catastrophic reversal of fortune, he cut a deal with his debtors to help secure his future. Jesus gave him full marks for being astute and shrewd. Jesus laments the fact that many of his followers, 'children of the light,' are not as smart in the face of the Great Reversal – which He is inaugurating in which 'the hungry will be filled with good things and the rich sent empty away' (Mary's *Magnificat*).

We should be using our money ('mammon') to alleviate the myriad hungers of the world, not to buy our way into Heaven, but so that we become the sort of person who will be able to enjoy the heavenly companionship of those who hungered.

We could take a moment to pause and take stock of the use of our resources which are *passing*, so that we may be received into the *eternal* habitation.

Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time-22nd September 2019 (Lk 16: 19-31)

Jesus told a parable, "There was a rich man. At his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus. He longed to fill his belly with the scraps from the rich man's table. Both men died and the rich man went to hell where he was in torment. Abraham said to him, 'In your life good things came to you and bad things to Lazarus. Now he is in comfort and you in agony."

Gospel Reflection

The rich man ('Dives') is so totally *self*-absorbed in the *self*-indulgence of his wealth that he does not even notice poor Lazarus at his gate. He created such a huge chasm between himself and the poor that not one crumb of food or companionship could cross over to Lazarus.

This chasm, *created* by Dives, was fixed at the moment of his death so that not one part of the life of Paradise could cross over to him – not even a drop of water. Hell is not a punishment sent by God. It is simply the continuation of the Divide which some have chosen as that which defines who they are. Hell is of our own making.

We could pause for a moment to check that we are making such choices that we become amongst those 'carried gently by the angels into Paradise'.

Literacy News

Holiday Tips for Parents-Avoiding the Holiday Slide in Reading

Many children, especially struggling readers, forget some of what they've learned or slip out of practice during the holidays. Try these strategies to help your child improve their reading during the break and beyond:

- 1. **Six books to success:** Research shows that reading just six books during the holidays may keep a struggling reader from regressing. When choosing the six, be sure that they are just right not too hard and not too easy. Take advantage of your <u>local library</u>. Ask for help selecting books that match your child's age, interests, and abilities. Libraries often run reading programs that motivate kids to read, so find out what's available in your area.
- 2. **Read something every day:** Encourage your child to take advantage of every <u>opportunity</u> to read. Find them throughout the day:
 - *Morning:* The newspaper even if it is just the comics or today's weather.
 - *Daytime:* Schedules, TV guides, magazines, online resources, etc. For example, if your daughter likes the food channel, help her look for a recipe on the network's Web site then cook it together for more reading practice.
 - Evening: End the day by having your child read to you from the book he is currently reading (one of the six books, above). Have them rehearse a paragraph, page, or chapter before reading to you. Rereading will help them be more fluent able to read at an appropriate speed, correctly, and with nice expression.
- 3. **Keep reading aloud:** Reading aloud benefits all children and teens, especially those who struggle. One benefit is that you can read books your child can't, so they will build listening comprehension skills with grade-level and above books. This will increase their knowledge and expand their experience with text, so that they will do better when they read on their own.

It's hard to keep up a reading routine in a season packed with distractions and diversions. These suggestions will fit into a busy schedule and make reading fun! *Source:*
