Grade Information Sessions

My appreciation and thanks to the many parents who attended the grade information sessions. Your support is very much appreciated. On your behalf many thanks to all the teachers for their time and commitment to working with you. It is working in partnership with you that we value, as it truly benefits your child's learning.

Getting to Know your Child

At OLA, assessment of the children's learning plays an important role in ensuring that teaching is matched to the child's learning needs. When assessing, the teachers collect, analyse and record information about the children's progress in their learning. While assessment occurs across all grades throughout the year, we place a particular focus on the early years of their formal schooling.

Over the first few weeks of this term, teachers have been assessing the children's literacy and numeracy abilities. Kindergarten & Year 1 children also complete the Literacy Early Years Assessment (EYA). These assessments allow the teachers to individually assess each child, learn about how they think, and to find out what they know and can do in literacy and numeracy. The information gathered from these assessments assists the children's teachers to plan learning experiences that best support the children's abilities and needs. So that the children's growth in their learning can be measured and monitored, many of these assessments will be administered again at the end of the school year.

Thank you for your continued support. It is in partnership that we can achieve great things for our children.

Literacy News

This year our school's learning goal is:

All students will demonstrate growth in comprehension with a specific focus on SURFACE, DEEP AND TRANSFER learning across all KLAs.

Ways to improve reading comprehension at home

Developing reading comprehension skills is important for absorbing story books as a young child. As children get older, this skill will help them understand textbooks, newspapers, and other more complex texts.

1. Have your child read aloud. This forces them to go slower, which gives them more time to process what they read and in turn improves reading comprehension. Plus, they are not only seeing the words — they are hearing them, too! You can also take turns reading aloud.

2. Provide books at the right level. Make sure your child gets lots of practice reading books that aren't too hard. They should recognize at least 90 percent of the words without any help. Stopping any more often than that to figure out a word makes it tough for them to focus on the overall meaning of the story

Games to play at home to help my child with Mathematics...

NUMBER BUSTING

Number busting is an activity that can be used to help children understand quantities of numbers. It allows children to manipulate a quantity to find that it is made up of a variety of smaller quantities. It is important that the children recognize that there is more than one way to bust a given number.

Most children benefit from using concrete materials such as bead strings to manipulate when busting a number. Children then use this knowledge to solve other mathematical problems.

TRY THIS:

Think of a number between 70 and 90 (smaller numbers for younger children, larger numbers for older children). Next, the challenge is to find as many ways as possible to split or partition this number in 2 minutes. Include some interesting or creative solutions. There is no limit to the number of splits.

Choose your favourite solution and explain why you have chosen to share it with a member of your family.

Do you Have the Information you Need?

Living Alongside our Neighbours

Please respect all properties neighbouring the school and ensure that our parking does not adversely affect our local neighbours, and the safety of everyone, particularly in surrounding streets. Our neighbours have a right to access their driveway and **parents must not park across driveways** or drive in an unsafe manner. A reminder that police and council officers regularly patrol (as has been the case recently) and fine drivers.

Parents are also requested to **not park** in front of our neighbour's wheelie bins that have not been emptied. A simple check if the bin has been emptied as a courtesy would ensure that you are not prohibiting our neighbour's bin from being emptied by the garbage trucks.

Why is my Child's Teacher out of Class?

Like professionals in other fields, all teachers are required to keep up to date with current thinking on best practices and new developments in all curriculum areas. From time to time teachers are required to attend professional development opportunities to learn about changes to curriculum, new methods of teaching & learning and other ways of integrating technology. These sessions sometimes occur during the day, after school or in the school holidays. Teachers are also given time at the beginning of the year to conduct assessments to pinpoint your child's learning needs. Some teachers also have additional responsibilities which benefit the whole school. At times, teachers are also required at diocesan events etc. Teachers also have entitlements such as sick leave, long service leave, maternity leave, bereavement leave, jury duty etc. Consequently, there will be times when your child's teacher is absent from the classroom. On these days the teacher's program and day book is followed. Teachers on a grade work closely together allowing the grade partners to liaise with the substitute teacher so that good teaching and learning continues, and routines are kept.
