## Literacy News

**This year our school's learning goal is: All students will demonstrate growth in comprehension with a specific focus on SURFACE, DEEP AND TRANSFER learning across all KLA's.**

### Ways to improve reading comprehension at home

#### Help them decode words by reading aloud

An awareness of the letters and sounds words make and understanding how they blend together to make words and sentences is called decoding. When you read you determine what the words are and whether they make sense in a sentence. The only way to check how your children decode, is to ask them to read aloud. This forces them to go slower, which gives them more time to process what they read, hearing the words as well as seeing the words on the page.

#### Find the right books

It's important not to set the bar too high. Generally, your child should recognize 90% of the words in the books they read in order to feel comfortable with the reading process. Stopping more often will interrupt the flow and will just confuse him or her as they try to focus on the overall meaning of the story. Obviously, also pick stories that interest them. It could be fairies, adventures, cars or Star Wars. We all prefer to read books about things we are interested in, so let your children do the same.

## Technology

### Six tips to searching safely

Here are some tips you can use when using search engines to find information online.

- 1. Use child-friendly search engines**
  - Google
  - Google Safe Search for kids
  - Kiddle
- 2. Use safe search settings**
  - Use safe search settings to filter out inappropriate content from search results.
- 3. Protect devices**
  - Ensure computers are installed with security software and is regularly updated to reduce the risk of viruses and other types of malware. Teach your kids not to accept files or open email attachments from people they don't know and trust in real life.
- 4. Bookmark preferred websites**
  - Reduce the risk of kids accessing unsuitable websites by bookmarking preferred sites accessible from their web browser. This way, they can go directly to favourite websites without having to first conduct a search to locate them online.
- 5. Check the website's safety**
  - It's simple to do this: just type in the phrase "is this website safe" into your browser, choose from one of the search results and then enter the website's URL address into the search field.
- 6. Talk about safe searching**
  - Talk to your child about safe searching, as well as the kind of websites they can view. Encourage them to speak to you about anything they find upsetting while playing games, visiting websites or social networking.

Education Ministers met today and decided that NAPLAN will not proceed in 2020. The NAPLAN test window was scheduled to be held from 12 to 22 May.
