Afternoon Drive Through

Our afternoon drive through car pick up has been very busy of late.

We are not alone. All schools face similar challenges, although we are very blessed to have grounds that facilitate a drive through.

- Your patience is very much appreciated.
- Yes it is slow (to start).
- Yes it takes time, but it is the safety of your children that is the priority.
- Yes it is congested. (The phasing of the lights does not help as cars back up).
- Yes the queue is long, as we have over 300 children using the drive through.

There are many options that you may also wish to investigate in relation to picking up your child:

- 1. Park at the oval and walk across the lights, collect your child and walk back. (This will be much quicker than the queue).
- 2. Park in surrounding streets and walk.
- 3. Walk and enjoy the exercise if close to school.
- 4. Come a little later rather than the "peak hour", ie. Drive through operates from 3.10pm until 3.40pm

We kindly ask that parents <u>do not</u> arrive before 2.30pm as Santa Sophia parents use the drive through at this time.

Further important points to note:

- Please drive to the parking bay where your child will be standing, so that your child basically lines up with the passenger door.
- ❖ For both drop-off and pickup, the drive through facility is not intended as a place for drivers to get out of vehicles. Children need to be independent in entering/exiting the vehicle. It is intended that parents remain in their vehicles whilst in the drive through area.

Thank you once again for your support as we work together as a community for our beautiful children.

School Times - Late Arrivals

School commences at 8.50am and concludes at 3.10pm. If you arrive any time from 8.50am then you must bring your child to the office to have them signed in and they will get a late pass. We have had a lot of children recently who have come to the office unattended. We thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

Exemption Forms

Please remember that an Application for Exemption Form MUST be completed at least three weeks prior to your child being away from school for five days or more.

This government requirement has now been in place for a few years and we are still getting parents advising us a day or two (or even the day of) before they leave for a vacation. If the certificate is not issued prior to you leaving, then your child's roll will be marked as an 'unexplained absence'. A note after the event does not suffice in this instance because the leave has to be approved by the principal prior to the holiday.

Absence Text

Please remember that if your child is away from school, you will receive a text message at 10.30am. Please click on the link and complete the information.

You must click on "Add Attendance Note" to submit your information as this will add your note to our system.

Notification Policy if Moving from OLA

If you are leaving OLA, please ensure you are aware that the Diocese requires a full terms notice (10 school weeks) in writing, to be given to the Principal before parents/guardians terminates a student's enrolment. According to Diocesan policy, if the required notice is not given, one term's school fees including diocesan fees are payable. Upon withdrawal of a student, fees are calculated on a pro-rata basis according to the notification period.

If there has been a change of circumstances in your home ie moving house, parent separation etc could you please email the office to advise us of any new address/es, phone numbers, etc. All up to date information is required by CEDP so that we can all work in better partnership with you.

If you purchase a second-hand item, please also make sure that your cross out the old name and mark it with your own. It is a shame that so many items do not get claimed.

We also ask that you regularly check the jumper/jacket that your child comes home with as they may have inadvertently picked up someone else's. Often names on jumpers are on the back side of the tag.

With winter and the cold weather now with us, please remember that all medication, including ventolin, MUST be left at the office and a medication form completed. This can be found on the website.


CHILDREN ARE NOT TO HAVE VENTOLIN IN THEIR BAGS OR POCKETS. It is best kept in the office.

Come on OLA! We can do it!

Write On is an annual **writing competition** open to all NSW primary students in Years 1 to 6. It is designed to encourage students to develop their imaginative writing skills, and supports the teaching of writing. The competition aligns with the learning objectives in the NSW <u>English K–10 Syllabus</u>. The WriteOn 2021 writing competition closes in Week 10, Term 2 (25th June).

Students compose an imaginative text of up to 500 words using the image as the stimulus. Schools submit **one** typed entry from each participating Stage using the <u>online entry form</u>. Refer to the <u>notes from WriteOn 2020</u> to see comments from the judges.

Imaginative pieces may include:

- narratives
- letters
- poems
- scripts for radio, screen and stage
- interviews
- journal entries.

Schools submit their best entry from each stage.

The entries are judged by a panel of experienced primary teachers from each sector.

Winter Uniform

You just have to look around the streets to note just how important the school uniform is as a presentation of a student and also the image of their school. We have a very smart school uniform, and we thank you, as parents, to instil in your children the importance of wearing the correct uniform. These photos show what correct uniform looks like for boys and girls. We thank you for your cooperation.



Please ensure:-

- That the top button is done up, or at least the tie is tight enough that it appears to be buttoned up
- Black leather shoes, not black joggers, are to be worn with the uniform
- Jumpers are to be worn with the uniform for both boys and girls (not cardigans)
- The bomber jacket is **NOT** to be worn instead of the jumper
- Woollen vest can be worn by either girls or boys
- Sports zip jacket is to be only worn on sports days.
- Fluorescent sport shoes are not allowed.



Acceptable Hair Styles for Boys.

The following is a passage in the parent handbook that refers to this...

"Hair is to be neat and tidy, off the collar, of consistent natural colour, of gradual even grade and extremes of fashion are to be avoided. Some examples of the styles that are unacceptable include: ridges, undercuts, steps, any excessive shaping with products, and any shaving cuts."

This includes boys' long hair in pony tails.
