Catholic Schools Week

This coming week we celebrate two special feast days. Firstly, St Patrick's Day, 17th March, where we invite the children to wear a green accessory with their normal school uniform. This can include ribbons, hair scrunchies, bangles, gloves, socks, laces, shamrock etc.



Secondly, given it is the Year of St Joseph we will celebrate St Joseph's Day on Friday 19th March with a whole school outdoor mass at 11.30am. Children may wear the Italian colours of green, white and red on this day. We kindly ask children to bring in a **gold or fold** donation which will go towards Project Compassion.

Parents are warmly invited to join us for Mass if they wish. If attending, we kindly ask you to adhere to the necessary Covid regulations. This will include upon arrival registering with the Government QR code along with signing in and sanitizing before entering the grounds. At mass parents will need to socially distance and use the seating provided in accordance with the square meter per person regulations that we are required to follow.

Thank you for your positive feedback regarding family week. Spending time and having 'experiences' with the family are what students crave. Family time is the most important time you can spend in building strong family relationships. Some activities undertaken by the children that have shared over the week have been:-

Gospel Reflection

This week's gospel demonstrates God's infinite patience with humankind. God gives the people another chance and calls on them to rebuild the Temple in Jerusalem. God is willing to wipe the slate clean and start afresh. It is in this context that we must understand the gospel passage. In yet another attempt to demonstrate love and forgiveness, God's only Son – the Word made Flesh – is sent into the world to lead the people from darkness to light. Despite the many, many attempts by God to demonstrate love and foster a relationship with humankind, the people have repeatedly rejected the relationship with God and preferred to live a life of selfishness and darkness. Yet we see through both of these readings the unquenchable nature of God who keeps giving humankind one more chance.

In our day-to-day relationships, it is true that we often seek to test the limits of the love that is expressed. Young people in particular often test the boundaries of their parents' love and the boundaries of others who care for them. It is often a test to reassure themselves of this love — will you still love me, even if I do this? Today's readings portray the people of God as adolescents constantly testing out the limits of God's love. In a remarkable act, God's own Son is sent into the world to die as a sign of the lengths to which God will go to assure humanity of the love that is theirs for the taking.

Gospel Focus

The gospel passage tells us that God's Son was not sent into the world to condemn it, but rather, 'so that through him the world might be saved'. It also tells us that whoever refuses to believe 'is already condemned'. God does not condemn the world, nor individuals within it. Indeed, God is absolutely determined to save the world. However, we do sometimes condemn ourselves. When we turn our back on love; when we hide from relationships; when we wallow in selfishness – we shut ourselves off from relationship with God and condemn ourselves. We only have to open our eyes to see the alternative!

St Joseph Mass (19th March 2021): The Catholic Church celebrates the Year of St Joseph from December 2020 to December 2021. Why? St Joseph was an inspirational father-tender and loving, obedient, accepting, creatively courageous and yet a father in the shadow.



Pope Francis declared it a special year pointing out how important 'ordinary' people are as they are seen as going unnoticed in the world. St Joseph had an essential 'behind the scene' role which he played in 'keeping things together' for the Holy Family.

In Year 1, students have been learning about Jesus the man. They were able to explain how He was like us (human) and how He was different to us (divine).


Lenten Home Focus

NEATNESS AND TIDINESS

Paying attention to one's appearance and personal cleanliness from an early age encourages students to take pride in the way they present themselves, not only at school, but at all times. Hair is to be neat and tidy, off the collar, of consistent natural colour, of gradual even grade and extremes of fashion are to be avoided. Some examples of the styles that are unacceptable include: ridges, undercuts, steps, any excessive shaping with products, and any shaving cuts. Girls' hair that is longer than shoulder length is to be tied back from the face and eyes. Ribbons, hair clips etc should be school colours. In the interest of safety, stud earrings only are permitted.
