Gospel Reflection Mk 7:1-8. 14-15. 21-23

No matter how good the intention, sometimes misguided principles can lead to false action. This is what Jesus chastised the Pharisees about. The traditions that had been established through the Pharisees and the Lawyers were certainly based on the Law as stated in the Torah. However, the practices that had been established to try to help people honour the Torah had effectively replaced the Law. In order to maintain spiritual cleanliness, a tradition of physical cleanliness had emerged – particularly around interaction with Gentiles and around eating. However, the purpose of the tradition had become lost. The need for physical cleanliness had replaced the maintenance of spiritual cleanliness.

The Pharisees observe some of the disciples eating without properly washing their hands and challenge Jesus about it. They are upholding the tradition that has effectively become the Law. Jesus reminds them – somewhat forcefully – that these external practices are not the Law; rather the Law is observed internally. Jesus goes so far as to call the Pharisees hypocrites. It is a criticism of them that the gospel writers attribute to Jesus quite frequently. For Jesus, hypocrisy was one of the greatest failings. Because Jesus placed such a high price on integrity of word and action he could not abide those who proclaimed to be just, pious or forgiving and yet acted in ways that were contrary to these claims. His chastisement of the Pharisees – calling them hypocrites – was a challenge to their observation of external practices and rituals instead of seeking to understand the Torah as a call to a change of heart. Jesus points out that no amount of ritual cleansing will make a person clean within. Similarly, evil and uncleanliness come from within a person – one doesn't 'catch it' from contact with strangers.

Thank you for your support

Covid numbers are high, and children are not immune from the Delta Covid strain. There have been many schools that have needed to close due to positive cases.

Maintaining the safety and wellbeing of our students and staff is the priority.

The Government is very clear that if children can stay at home, they MUST stay at home.

Please do everything you can to keep your children at home. This is the best and safest option and ensures your child does not come into contact with others outside their immediate family.

As communicated, children at school are supervised only. There are minimal teachers on site. Classroom teachers do not supervise the children as they are working remotely facilitating online learning.

If your circumstances change and you have no other alternative but to send your child to school you must fall into one of the approved categories, ie. essential workers, vulnerable students or those who have no other supervision options. Most importantly, prior to your child attending you are required to contact the school via email (if your child has already been regularly attending, this is not required). This is simply because, as you can appreciate, we only aim to have a very limited number of staff onsite for supervision purposes. Therefore, it is important that we are aware of how many students to expect.

Supporting your Child with Primary Mathematics

Please see attached to this newsletter an easy to read article which has some great ideas about how you can best support your child at home in mathematics during lockdown. Some of the key messages and principles apply to mathematics learning in general, whether at school or at home. They include:-

- Do not portray that you yourself are not good at maths or don't enjoy it
- Display a positive attitude towards maths tasks with a 'growth mindset'
- Bring maths into your daily conversations
- Look for opportunities outside of the home, within literature and games
- Ask problem solving questions 'How do you know?"

Theme for the Week "Respect"

This week focuses on the way we respect others and the relationships we form. Treating others as equals requires mutual respect and a true sense of accepting others regardless of their differences, be it physical, materialistic or intellectual. Our children are continually encouraged to respect others as they would themselves.

Values Matter at OLA

This week we are focussing on the value of <u>Respect</u>. We all want to feel important, to be treated kindly, and to have our thoughts and feelings shared without negative comments. Ina word, we want RESPECT. But how often do we stop to think about how we treat others? Do we exhibit respectful behaviour towards others?

Respect is one of the foundational pillars of all healthy relationships. Respect toward others comes from recognising the inherent worth of every person. It means being able to communicate your position in a kind and courteous manner and allowing others to have and express their own opinions and beliefs without fear of rejection, even if they are different from your own. Respect means caring about the feelings of others.

This value includes the following characteristics:-How do you practise Respect?

Think about how you want to be treated, then treat others that way. Ask yourself, "How do I want others to treat my belongings or my right to privacy? How do I want others to talk and listen to me? How do I want others to treat me when we need to resolve conflicts?"

- Treating others the way you want to be treated, no matter how they treat you.
- Showing kindness and consideration
- Respecting yourself; liking yourself enough to be yourself
- Accepting others for who they are
- Showing high regard for authority, (School Rules) other people, self and country.
- Use good manners; speaking courteously to everyone, even if there is a conflict
- Be considerate of the feelings of others
- Deal peacefully with anger, insults and disagreements
- Treating property and the environment with care.

The overall message:

Showing regard for the worth of someone or something. It includes respect for self, respect for the rights and dignity of all persons, and respect for the environment that sustains all life.

PLEASE NOTE – IMPORTANT INFORMATION Student Data Validation - Please update your contact details

On Monday 16 August you should have received an email or SMS (for those parents without email) from Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP) asking you to review and, where necessary, update the key information they hold about your children currently enrolled in CEDP schools.

The purpose of this review is to ensure that CEDP has the right details to correctly identify and support students, including contacting families in an emergency or to share important updates.

Steps have been taken to ensure this process is as secure as possible to protect your information and your family's privacy. Your information is only accessed by authorised staff when it is necessary and in accordance with our <u>Privacy Policy.</u>

The link is **open until Friday 3 September** and I encourage you to complete the review/update as soon as possible to ensure that your family's correct details are on file. This is particularly important as Greater Sydney remains in lockdown due to the COVID-19 outbreak.

Only one person per family needs to complete the survey and it takes about 15 minutes to complete. If you have any questions or to seek help, please contact the CEDP Community Liaison Team on 9840 5796.
