

# WEEK TWO FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER YEAR A (30-4-2023)



#### Gospel Reflection (John 10:1-10)

The fourth Sunday of Easter is sometimes known as Good Shepherd Sunday. Whilst shepherds were not highly regarded, they often put their lives in danger to tend to their flocks. Of a night time, several flocks of sheep would be penned in a communal sheepfold, usually made of stone walls. There was only one entrance to the sheepfold and one of the shepherds would effectively become the gate by sleeping across the entranceway. This was to keep the sheep in but also to guard against thieves. When Jesus described himself as the gate of the sheepfold, his audience would have immediately understood the analogy. For a shepherd to become the gate to the sheepfold of a night was to risk his life for not only his own sheep but all the sheep in the fold overnight. It took courage and demonstrated utter commitment. Jesus quite deliberately makes clear that he and the Father

are one: the Lord is the shepherd and Jesus is the good shepherd. This passage reminds us it is about living a life filled with purpose and intent. If we fail to live with purpose and meaning then our life is a hollow shell of what it could be. Jesus came that we may have life — a life that is at its fullest when it is lived in such a way as to be an expression of what Jesus taught and lived. (Greg Sunter @ Liturgyhelp.com)

#### **Returning Notes & Permission Slips**

For those families who may be unaware of our procedures:-

Each morning teachers will ask the children in their class if they have any notes or money. Teachers will keep any information they require and will send any other notes or money to the office via the class note bag (please ensure envelopes containing money are tightly secured and labelled). This system allows the office to receive notes and money efficiently. It also helps the children develop responsibility for passing on information.

## **Transition to Winter Uniform**

For those new to school life & OLA, the students will transition into their winter uniform by week 4 of Term 2 (Monday 15<sup>th</sup> May), depending on the weather. # **OLA Celebrates Anzac Day**

The Anzac tradition was forged 107 years ago on 25<sup>th</sup> April 1915, when the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps landed on the Gallipoli Peninsula.

It marked the start of a campaign which lasted eight months and resulted in some 26,000 Australian casualties, including 8,159 who were killed or died of wounds or disease. The bravery and spirit of those who served on the Gallipoli Peninsula shaped a legend, and so the 'Anzac' became a part of the Australian and New Zealand lexicon. In 1916, the first anniversary of the landing was observed in Australia, New Zealand, England and by troops in Egypt. That year, 25<sup>th</sup> April was named 'Anzac Day'. By the 1920's, Anzac Day ceremonies were held throughout Australia and the states had designated Anzac Day as a public holiday. Commemoration of Anzac Day continued throughout the 1930's and 1940's, with World War II veterans joining parades around the country.

Over the ensuing decades, returned Australian Servicemen and women from conflicts such as Malaysia, Vietnam, Korea, East Timor, Iraq and Afghanistan, as well as peacekeepers and veterans from allied countries, now march proudly in the parades.

#### Write On Competition 2023

To participate in the competition, students compose an imaginative text of up to 500 words in length using the image above as a stimulus.

This competition is held in association with the State Library of NSW. The presentation ceremony for Gold Award winners will take place at the library (date is to be confirmed). Silver and Bronze Award winners' certificates will be posted to principals after the ceremony. Information about the competition will continue to be communicated in NESA News.

Write On is an annual **writing competition** open to all NSW primary students in Years 1 to 6. It is designed to encourage students to develop their imaginative writing skills, and supports the teaching of writing. The competition aligns with the learning objectives in the NSW <u>English K–10 Syllabus</u>. The WriteOn 2023 writing competition closes **at 4 pm on Friday 16 June (Week 8, Term 2).** Students compose an imaginative text of up to 500 words using the image as the stimulus. Please refer to the <u>judges' notes from WriteOn 2022</u>.



Imaginative pieces may include:

- narratives
- letters
- poems
- scripts for radio, screen and stage
- interviews
- journal entries.

Schools submit one typed entry from each participating Stage of learning - a maximum of 3 in total.

#### Assessment criteria


When assessing entries, judges use the following criteria:

- makes connections to the stimulus image
- engages the audience in imaginative, interpretive, emotive and/or creative ways
- maintains a consistent structure appropriate for the type of text selected
- uses a range of strategies to engage the intended audience
- uses a variety of language forms and features, vocabulary and punctuation
- considers the context, purpose and audience
- includes age-appropriate content
- is within the 500 word limit.
