Parenting is a challenge for each one of us. The holidays can often be a time for reflecting on this important role. With so many varying opinions of what successful parents entails, the following extract is worth a read:-

These 12 principles are the basis of successful parenting as presented by Michael Grose – one of Australia's foremost parenting experts:-

- 1. Treat children as you want to be treated at all times with love, respect and human dignity.
- 2. Manage children's behaviour by managing yourself first and focusing on your own behaviour.
- 3. As children learn what they live, model the attitudes and behaviours you want them to learn. In particular, model optimism, generosity, persistence and forgiveness of self and others.
- 4. Mirror back to your children that they are competent and capable. They see themselves in the same way as significant adults in their lives see them.
- 5. Build happy childhood memories by having plenty of positive one-on-one interactions and enjoyable family times. Build strong family upon the building blocks of tolerance, rituals and open communication.
- 6. Children feel secure when there are limits and boundaries but they also like a say in setting some of those boundaries. Use behavioural consequences to teach children to be responsible for their actions.
- 7. Childhood is to be protected, treasured, and preserved as long as humanly possible. Childhood is something children need to grow into, not out of.
- 8. Give responsibility, invite co-operation, and expect participation in all aspects of family life.
- 9. Develop resilience in children by promoting independence, problem-solving and real participation in family life. Ensure you look after yourself, so you have perspective and energy to look after your children.
- 10. Surround yourself and your children with healthy, positive adults who look out for you and your children.
- 11. Foster your children's passions and interest so that they can find something that they can excel at.
- 12. Treat your children as if you have many. That way, you can give them the space to grow away and be themselves.

Thank you for your continued support. It is in partnership that we can achieve great things for our children.

Welcome



SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR A (23-07-2023)

Gospel Reflection (Matthew 13:24-43)

This week's gospel features three parables about the kingdom: the weeds in the field; the mustard seed; and yeast in the flour. They are three fascinating parables about something undesirable or unwanted being mixed in with something that is apparently good – and Jesus presents them as descriptions of what the kingdom of heaven is like. Jesus use a similar imagery to reflect the situation of the world and the reality of living a life of faith. Our life is full of wheat and weeds beautiful acts and experiences of faith and loves, and challenging, painful experiences of resentment and hurt. Sts. Joachim & Anne

Joachim and Anne were greatly honoured by God who gave them a daughter conceived without sin who was to become known as the Mother of God! It would seem that they performed their parenting responsibilities with great grace. Their feast day on July 26 is a day to honour them and all grandparents for their contribution to our lives.

Fact File

We know very few facts about Sts. Joachim and Anne.The only recorded stories of them are from an apocryphal gospel dating from the 4th Century AD called the Protoevangelium of James. The legend told in this document says that after years of childlessness, an angel appeared to tell Anne and Joachim that they would have a child. Anne promised to dedicate this child to God. Whatever their names or the facts of their lives, we can assume that Mary was raised in a Jewish family home faithful to God and to the religious traditions of her day such that she was led to respond wholeheartedly to God's request with faith, "Let it be done to me as you will."



Tech Tip Week 1

Do you chat to your child about what they do when using technology?

General tips about how to start the chat, whatever the subject.

1. Plan – work out what you want to say and how you want to say it, depending on the issue you want to talk about. Being in an environment where you can talk without being interrupted can also make things more comfortable for parent and child. Perhaps have the talk while you're doing something together, like a long walk or a car trip – especially if you think it will be hard to keep your child engaged in the conversation.

2. Listen, don't judge – let your child know you are there to help them, no matter what. Listening will also help you understand their attitudes and respond to specific issues. For example: I understand what you're saying, and I'm glad you came to me about this. You're not going to get into trouble, but we need to trust each other, fix this and move forward.'

3. Ask questions – asking questions about how they feel and what they know helps you to gauge your child's level of knowledge and keeps you from lecturing.

4. Get help if you need it – Reach out to the safety commissioner if needed.

Diocesan Voice of Youth

This term the students from Year 6 will be competing in the Parramatta Diocese Voice of Youth Competition. Our children are all busy writing and practising their speeches to present to their classes. The students have been given a list of criteria for judging. Some of these include:-

- Timing 3-4 minutes
- Stance posed, comfortable
- Topic Interest Audience engagement, appropriate level
- Voice clarity, variety, volume, pitch
- Eye contact/gestures

Students will present their speeches in their individual classes where three students from each class will be chosen to participate in our school level final to be held on Wednesday 9th August at 9.00am in the year 6 classroom. From this, two children will be chosen to represent OLA at a Cluster Final on Monday 28th August at 10.00am at Blessed John XXII. One winner from the cluster will progress to the semi-final and perhaps the grand final following later in the term. This diocesan speech contest is being conducted so that children with a flair for public speaking have an opportunity to use this talent. Good luck to all our Year 6 students. Parents are most welcome to come along and support our students at the school level final on Monday 9th August.

School Census Day – Friday 4th August

Friday 4th August is School Census Day. All children should attend school on this day and absence should only be if it is absolutely necessary.

NAIDOC

We gathered in prayer this week with ears open to deep listening, hearts open, and hands linked as one family to acknowledge NAIDOC week, which occurred during the school holidays.

We are all children of this land. We remember that God is our Creator and that St Francis of Assisi as Patron Saint of the Environment, recognised the Creator's Spirit within and through all of Creation. St Francis felt transformed with the Spirit through all that lived and breathed around him.



Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people were the first custodians and caretakers of Australia. Their rich culture has existed for tens of thousands of years.

This year the theme for NAIDOC week was 'For Our Elders'.

Across every generation, our Elders - people in our community (parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles) have played, and continue to play, an important role in our communities and families. They guide our generations and pave the way for us to take the paths we can take today. We draw strength from their knowledge and experience, in everything from land management, cultural knowledge to justice and human rights.

Why do we have 'Welcome to Country' and 'Acknowledgement of Country'?

Having a 'Welcome to Country' and 'Acknowledgement of Country' as a standard practice in events recognises the place of Indigenous people as the first custodians of this land, promotes awareness of the history and culture of Indigenous people and formally acknowledges Indigenous people's ongoing connection to the land.

'Country' is the term often used by Aboriginal peoples to describe the lands, waterways and seas to which they are connected. The term contains complex ideas about law, place, custom, language, spiritual belief, cultural practice, material sustenance, family and identity. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people strongly believe that they are not owners of the land but caretakers of the land. It is our responsibility to look after our land - look after 'Country'.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people welcomed one another from different clans or groups - an invitation to care for the land and respect the environment.

When we are 'Welcomed to Country' by and Aboriginal elder we are being invited to care for the land and be respectful of the traditions.

Building Child Safe Communities

As opportunities come about for parents to volunteer at school or for excursions, please consider completing the Building Child Safe Communities Online Training module in anticipation of being able to assist. This should only take about 15 minutes and it then gets sent to CEDP for approval. Once completed, it is valid for two years. Please note that in any event, this MUST be completed before you can assist in any way at school.

To 'BOUNCE BACK' means that we can be happy or successful again after having a problem.

We are all capable of developing skills and strategies to 'Bounce Back' and build resilience.

This term students at OLA will be given the opportunity to transfer and apply their knowledge of resilience and the ability to bounce back in a structured and safe learning environment by playing games. These games will provide students with experiences of winning and losing. Winning and losing are great opportunities for teaching children appropriate actions and reactions, and to understand the ups and downs of life. It can give the chance to slow down and take time to figure out how to move forward, and what to do to improve next time.

Learning through games can be a highly effective and enjoyable way to gain knowledge and skills, both in winning and losing situations. Games offer a dynamic and interactive environment that promotes active learning, problemsolving, critical thinking, and strategic decision-making.

Many aspects of a child's life are connected to competitions. It, therefore, becomes important for teachers and parents to teach children that winning and succeeding is a part of life, but also that to lose is equally important. By showing kids that losing is not the end of the world, children learn that life is full of second chances.


100 Days of Kindergarten
