THE TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD (06-08-2023)

Gospel Reflection Matthew 17:1-9

In today's Gospel, Jesus takes his most trusted disciples up a high mountain to allow them to share in what he knows is about to occur. It is a very clear teaching moment in which Jesus hopes the disciples are going to finally grasp the truth about him. As the disciples stand by, Jesus is transformed before them – suddenly bathed in light and his clothes become dazzlingly white. The disciples also see Moses and Elijah standing and talking with Jesus. Moses was the great Law-giver of Jewish tradition and Elijah the great prophet. Together, they represent the Law and the Prophets – the combined wisdom that make up the tradition of Jewish teaching and Jewish scripture. Jesus' transfiguration was a physical transformation that was able to be witnessed by his disciples. In



our lives we have many transforming moments but they are rarely as physically obvious to others as Jesus' transfiguration. Sometimes we fail to recognise a transformative event until well after the fact – sometimes years later. Sometimes we experience powerful moments of connection with God or with other people. Sometimes this might be through a special experience of nature; a meaningful retreat experience; a powerful sense of being 'in tune' with another person; a reflective prayer experience; or some other significant experience. The temptation when we have these experiences is to wish that we could remain in the experience. The challenge, however, is to take that experience back into the everyday of our lives – changed by it without remaining in it.

<u>Feast of St Mary MacKillop of the Cross</u> Tuesday, 8th August

'Never see a need without doing something about it'

Mary MacKillop is a wonderful role model to us all. She was indeed a woman of faith and devotion. Her attitude of 'never see a need without doing something about it' inspires us to reach out to others and to truly make a difference.

May MacKillop was born in 1842 in Melbourne, Victoria. Her parents were born in Scotland and came to live in Australia. Mary cared about people who had no-one to look after them such as boys and girls who just roamed the streets, children in the country who had no school to go to, people who were old and sick and people who had nowhere to live. Mary wanted more than anything to help these people. Mary went to work as a teacher in a little country town in South Australia called Penola. There she met Father Julian Tension Woods who also wanted to do something for the poor children who could not afford to pay the money needed to go to school Together, in 1866, they began the first St Joseph's School in an old stable.

On 19th March 1866 – St Joseph's Day – Mary started to wear a simple black dress and began the Congregation of the Sisters of St Joseph. Now as a Sister, she dedicated her life to doing God's work. As more and more young women joined Mary as Sisters, they were able to start more schools. All children were welcomed at their schools, even if they couldn't pay. In Adelaide they opened a place for women who had nowhere to live, an orphanage for children who had no parents to look after them and a house where poor people could come and stay. The Sisters visited people who were in gaol and those who were poor and sick. Mary MacKillop was kind to all people. She died on 8th August 1909 in North Sydney. Mary MacKillop kept her faith in God and bravely challenged those who did not support her vision for a more caring world. Mary is an important Australian who spent her life helping people, especially children.

She is Australia's First Saint.

Ways to improve reading comprehension at home

Reread to build fluency.

To gain meaning from text and encourage reading comprehension, your child needs to read quickly and smoothly — a skill known as fluency. By the beginning of Year 3, for example, your child should be able to read 90 words a minute.

Rereading familiar, simple books gives your child practice at decoding words quickly, so they'll become more fluent in their reading comprehension.

Repeating, Reviewing, and Remembering

The more we engage with a story, the more we take away from it. That is often why, as adults, we choose to reread those classics we were assigned to read as students in school. We're sure to get more out of the book the second or third time we read it. Similarly, when kids listen to the same story multiple times, they pick up new information, dive deeper into the meaning of the book, and make connections between themselves and the book and between the book and other books they've heard.








Tech Tip Week 3 When is the 'right' age to give kids a smartphone?

Put simply, there's no universal, or prescriptive age that's believed 'right' or 'safe' to give kids a mobile phone. Many families give kids a phone as it's a safety issue, peer acceptance, or as a way to make contact with them.

It is important to remember that a phone can be more than a phone. It is a powerful communication tool. They can create images, videos and written messages that can be uploaded and digitally distributed at the click of a button. They can download apps and games which allow them to interact with others.

Here are some things to consider:

- Is your child emotionally and cognitively ready to deal with a phone?
- Is your child able to follow rules and boundaries set for them by you when you are not around them?
- Are they responsible for their belongings?
- Are they resilient?
- Is a smartphone the answer?

If you decide to give your child a phone, consider the following strategies:

- Establish firm BOUNDARIES and RULES (don't overwhelm a child with lots of rules. Keep them minimal and simple).
- Keep devices in publicly accessible spots in the home and out of bedrooms.
- Minimise phone use at night.
- Do regular screen audits with them.
- Teach them how to use it respectfully and responsibly.
- Know what your child is doing with their phone.

We Bounce Back and Move Forward at OLA

Throughout the term, students at OLA will participate in a variety of team building activities and games that are designed to support children in self regulating their emotions, build resilience and develop trust with their peers.

The Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority outlines the importance of children maintaining positive relationships.

WHY RELATIONSHIPS ARE IMPORTANT

Good relationships early in life help children to connect with others, build positive friendships and support children to self-regulate their emotions.

Social competence

To build positive relationships with others, children need to develop 'social competence' and the ability to interact with others with care, empathy and respect. Social competence is the foundation that allows children to understand and self-regulate their own emotions and negotiate their interactions with others.

Children's individual ability to connect with others and build relationships will vary greatly. The range of children's personalities and social skills plays an important part in the way they relate to others.

Some things you may expect to see in school age children:

- they continue to develop their social skills to further build and sustain relationships with adults, educators and other children
- they are increasingly aware of peer differences and are more empathetic and aware of their personal responsibilities towards others
- they value acceptance while developing an understanding that group interactions can create challenges and conflicts
- they bring existing relationship dynamics to the education setting.
